RESEARCH WRITING: STARTER PHRASES. Sometimes we find it difficult to find the right phrase to start sentences. At such times, a useful strategy is to borrow the phrases of others, known as ' syntactic borrowing ' (Kamler & Thomson, 2006; Swales & Feak, 2004). To do this, look at some sentences in various sections of a research journal in your discipline and remove all the content, leaving a sentence skeleton.

Numerals & statistics. These tend to capture the reader ' s attention. Note that it will not be advisable to guess numbers or select any number of statistics. Make sure that you have done ample research on the topic you are covering to avoid false statements. Another great starter is the highlight of your article.
