Apart from the Rolex reference number and the serial number, Rolex bracelets are also equipped with a so-called bracelet and clasp code. The Rolex bracelet code can be found on the inside of the clasp hinge. There, you'll find a code which represents the year and month of which the watch was manufactured. Have in mind that the Rolex bracelet code may tell a different date/year than the watch case, and especially for modern Rolex watches, it's quite seldom that you find a clasp code that ...

A Rolex reference number and Rolex serial number appear on the case of your Rolex. Depending on the year of manufacture, a reference number will be four to six digits. These digits define its features. Serial numbers can be found inbetween the lugs on the side of the case at the 6 o'clock side, behind the bracelet.

Rolex bracelet codes are found on the inner part of the Rolex bracelet clasp and started in the 1950's when Rolex also began stamping the inner caseback of their watches. The only difference being that Rolex used roman numerals for the 'quarter' stamp in the case back and standard numerals for their 'quarter' bracelet stamps – so a 4th quarter watch from 1965 would be stamped IV.65 in the case back but 4.65 for the bracelet and with the quarter number stamped above the year.

Cerachrom: Rolex's proprietary ceramic is scratch-proof, impervious to UV rays, and is the current standard for the bezel inserts on Rolex's sport watches. Precious Stones: Name it, and Rolex has likely mounted it to a watch, but diamonds are most common. Chromalight: Rolex's lume. Blue by night, bright

white by day.

The Rolex serial numbers are found between the lugs on the side of the case at the 6 o'clock side, behind the bracelet. This 4-8 digit number is engraved by Rolex on every watch and it can be used to determine its production date. Beginning in 2005, the Company started to also engrave the serial number on the inside flange (or "rehaut" as it's called in French) between the dial and the crystal.
